Dear friends of UNI,

As the Interim Director of the Women's and Gender Studies Department, I am thrilled to share a springtime update on the growth and renewal of our program.

Over the past year, our program has blossomed, much like the beautiful flowers and trees on UNI's campus would have if it had quit snowing this spring. WGS's affiliate faculty and board members have continued to cultivate groundbreaking research, and have shared their work at conferences and events across the country. Heather Jerónimo, a WGS Advisory Board member and Associate Professor in Languages and Literatures, for example is sharing the work from a recent book publication in a new one-time course offering: Queer Families around the Globe. By the end of the course, students will recognize the wide spectrum of lived experiences of queer families from around the world, becoming versed in the unique challenges of these families, as well as the joys and successes shown in their representation.

In addition to the work of our faculty, our students have engaged in outreach and programming that have helped to pollinate the wider community in important conversations about gender and social justice. Three of our graduate students visited Hansen Elementary in Cedar Falls and spoke with 85 students about the importance of being active in the community and what the Women's and Gender Studies program does to make our community a safer and more equitable place.

Our annual Women's History Month celebration, bloomed into a colorful array of diverse speakers whose expertise ranged in topics from "whole life doula" to leadership. In collaboration with the Center for Multicultural Education, we hosted a panel and luncheon, featuring speakers from the Great Plains Action Society and Monsoon Asians & Pacific Islander in Solidarity.

Looking ahead, we remain committed to nurturing our mission of promoting gender equity, diversity, and inclusivity. We will continue to offer innovative courses that challenge our students to think critically about the intersection of gender with race, sexuality, class and other social identities. And we will continue to provide a supportive and inclusive learning environment that fosters personal growth and intellectual curiosity, like the springtime showers (or snows) that nourish new growth.

what womanhood means to you & explain how you have seen yourself represented or left out of mainstream narratives about women. When asked about the idea of Women's History Month and how our collective understanding of women's history should change, the panelists talked about how the language used needs to be more inclusive. It is important to learn the histories of other groups of people to better understand the way that they experience different forms of oppression apart from your own. Everyone needs to ask themselves how they are going to be more inclusive, and to challenge those around you that seek to silence minorities who have a history of being silenced. History tends to repeat itself, and we need to be able to identify patterns that show that society is trending backwards.

#### Hansen Elementary Activism Presentation - April 3, 2023

As a part of our program's tradition in community engagement, our GAs: Saja Abd Elhai, Meghan Cutcher, and Noshaba Shafiq, had the opportunity to deliver a presentation titled "Introduction to Activism" to the 5th graders at Hansen Elementary School.

This is the first time since COVID-19 that we are back to in-person presentations and it

was a great start to the month of April.




**GRADUATING STUDENT HIGHLIGHT**

Gideon is graduating this spring after a very busy semester doing his internship project at Friends of the Family (FOF) and defending his Research Paper "Victim Service models for Homelessness Caused by Domestic Violence: Implication for Implementation in Ghana" Due to his role at FOF, he was awarded the Tomson Internship Award! He had this to say about his internship:



"My role as a cultural liaison involves working closely with culturally specific agencies and exploring more about the services they provide to their targeted population in Iowa. I also work with the community outreach specialist to embark on intervention services for the general population or victims about to be evicted from their homes due to rent issues or any other issues likely to make a person homeless. Another role I am passionate about, and my internship came with, was as a housing advocate. I work closely with housing advocates to provide trauma-informed housing and comprehensive support to guests in the Waverly Shelter. In addition, I work directly with survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, human trafficking, and other violent crimes who are currently fleeing violence."
