SCHOLARSHIPS

The Department of History at the University of Northern lowa offers 16 different scholarship funds for students studying history: for prospective and declared history majors, regardless of year standing; year-specific scholarships to assist sophomores, juniors, seniors and graduate students; and scholarships for history teaching and social science teaching majors.

Public History Minor

Public history at the undergraduate level can be an important asset to any Bachelor of Arts degree. History majors and students studying in related disciplines are encouraged to consider the minor, and its emphasis on research skills and public engagement, as a compliment to their primary degree program. Students begin their public history work the first semester of their junior year. — 18 credits

Public History Certificate

Public History at the undergraduate level can be an important asset to any Bachelor of Arts degree. History majors and students studying in related disciplines are encouraged to consider the minor, and its emphasis on research skills and public engagement, as a compliment to their primary degree program. Students who are not enrolled in degree program or those who wish to add a shorter sequence of classes in Public History to their course of study can consider taking a Public History certificate. — 15 credits

Museum Studies Certificate

The Museum Studies certificate exposes students to the array of occupations in the museum industry and provides them opportunity to add an experiential component to their academic education. The certificate is available to upper division undergraduate and graduate students who have completed the introductory course, seminar, internship and methods and elective courses in their field of study.
